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Pastor's Note



Dear First Pres Friends,

As we turn the page from summer to fall, our focus also turns to the question "Who Is My Neighbor?" This is the question Jesus posed to the lawyer in the parable of the Good Samaritan and it's incredibly relevant to the time in which we live.

It was last February when the idea for a Fall focus on "Who Is My Neighbor?" first came to my mind. I was watching the Grammys and listening to Luke Combs and Tracy Chapman sing "Fast Car". Here were two people who seem incredibly different, but when they sang that song together we saw that our troubles and dreams can connect us and how much more we can accomplish

together. It was a powerful moment.

The Church, the Body of Christ, can be a model for coming together. Indeed, we need to be a model for coming together. Division and the stoking of division is at an all-time high. And it's easier to divide than to build. But in the face of a stranger we should see a neighbor; in the face of a stranger, our faith requires us to see a neighbor. But there's even more . . .

The Good Samaritan challenges us not only to be a neighbor to people we don't really like, it challenges us to see how the people or group we don't like has something to teach us about being a neighbor. Now that's hard. But our faith can equip us to survive, and even thrive, in our current atmosphere. Because the endless cycle of revenge, division, and retaliation can be broken by only one thing: a hand extended in mercy and a hand that accepts it.

My sermon series begins on September 8 and concludes on World Communion Sunday when we'll literally gather at Christ's table as one. On September 22 and 29 at 10:00am in the Parlor, I'm leading a book discussion on "The Book of Obligations: The Ten Habits of Good Citizens". The parish art show, Hymn Fest in October, and the theater's production of Beauty and the Beast will all touch on this topic, and even our youth will be discussing it in their new Sunday morning class.

So let us, the church, the body of Christ, stand tall and show the world how it should be done. Let's work together. Let's organize together. Let's pray together. Let's stand together. Let's heal the land.*

Church in the Park



Touchy Topics Resumes in September:

The latest Touchy Topic Book Study will be held Sundays, September 22 and 29, at 10:00am in the Parlor. Join Annie Epling as she leads a book study on The Book of Obligations: The Ten Habits of Good Citizens. In The Bill of Obligations, bestselling author Richard Haass argues that, to solve our climate



of division and safeguard our democracy, the very idea of citizenship must be revised and expanded. The Bill of Rights is at the center of our Constitution, yet the most intractable conflicts often emerge from cases that, as former Supreme Court Justice Stephen Breyer pointed out, "are not about right versus wrong. They are about right versus right."

There is a way forward: to place obligations on the same footing as rights. The ten obligations that Haass introduces here reenvision what it means to be an American citizen, to commit to our fellow citizens and counter the growing apathy, anger, and

violence that threaten us all.

FPC Study Connection Tutors: Is It Worthwhile? Recently I received a note


from a former student who had been in my class several decades ago, and I brightened up with the expectation of his belated appreciation for Latin. But no. He recounted a day when I stopped him in the hall after he had served detention for smoking, and I had apparently shared a very personal and tragic story about the perils of tobacco. He wrote that he had overcome the habit then and was still grateful to me. I had no memory of the brief encounter.



I share this only as an anecdotal example of the power of simply connecting with a young person, even for an hour a week. I have witnessed the lit-up faces, the hugs, the shy smiles of our students upon entering our Study Connection room. This may be the only time in the week when an adult is waiting to greet them with a warm welcome, a snack, a book to read, and a game to play. Are there frustrations? Yes. Do they all make visible progress? No. Is it worthwhile? As worthwhile as any endeavor forged from love and hope for the betterment of our community's children.
